Dear Parishioners of St. Francis and St. Clare Parish

Today's readings can be difficult to hear. The first reading speaks of princes who hate Jeremiah for reforming the people. The princes say that Jeremiah is demoralizing the soldiers and people in the city. This is ironic because Jeremiah is, in fact, reforming the people. He is giving them morals. So, why do the princes hate him? Jeremiah has brought change. He is correcting their evil ways and telling them how they should live according to God's laws. So, the princes are angry because Jeremiah is correcting them and, just like many of us, they don't like to be corrected. I know I don't like being corrected, even in the littlest things. There are those times that we do something wrong, even an accident, and someone just has to come along and point it out. It drives me nuts, and yet, it shouldn't. I simply don't like being wrong, and that's a very human feeling. We should trust that people are trying to give us corrections out of love. We should listen to their advice with patience, even if we already know everything they're telling us. Now, I'm sitting here writing this feeling very guilty. I do *not* like corrections. But listening patiently and letting go of my ego is something I'm working on. So, I encourage you to do the same. Assume the best in others. Hope that those who are offering corrections have your best interest in mind. If something doesn't sound right, if they seem like they might be trying to lead you astray, it might be a good time to talk to a priest or other trustworthy person in your life. Another problem we face is that there are people who will over correct. People who simply will not let you live something down. Sometimes it's teasing that goes to far, but other times it's simply being mean. Those are the times we have to learn to walk away. It is better to leave the situation feeling good about how you handled yourself. Trust me, that is a very nice feeling. And yet, it's another thing I still need to work on. That's why it feels so good to handle things properly! Improvement brings satisfaction. The last aspect of this reading I'd like to talk about is giving corrections kindly. Again, I'm guilty of doing this the wrong way, especially with the people closest to me in my life. What I'm slowly learning is how to correct with love. Jeremiah knew the evil that was being done by the people, yet it was out of love that he corrected them. He wanted to save them from the trap they'd built themselves. He imitates the "hard love" of God the Father. When we see someone who we love leading a life that does not follow God's way, we want to help them. It is important to give corrections like this with love. Remember why you are giving the correction. You are doing this because you care. Perhaps the best way you can correct is by sharing your own life experiences. Share things you have found helpful in your life. I know that this is something I benefit from. Hearing people talk about their life experiences, the ups and the downs, helps us grow because it reminds us that we're all human. We all fall down. But redemption is not impossible. There is story upon story that will inspire us. God wants to forgive us, no matter what we've done. That's incomprehensible love. He's called us to be messengers of that love. In this Jubilee Year of Hope, tell the world that there is always hope in Jesus. Nothing is impossible for God. Live in that hope! Have a blessed week!
