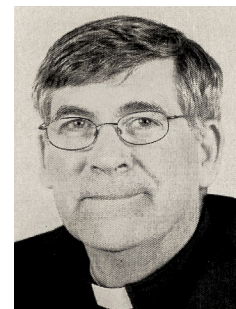

This week's guest writer is Carley Romer:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In light of the recent feast of Saint Monica and Bishop Pohlmeier's homily, I felt inspiration for another aspect of growing in hope. Saint Augustine is one of the many examples in our Church that remind us there is hope for everyone. Saint Augustine's mother, Saint Monica, was married to a pagan named Patricius. He lived a sinful worldly life. St. Monica had a good influence on him with her prayers and patience. They had three children, two of which entered the religious life, but Augustine was far from their piety. Though his mother raised him in the faith, he drifted away from her and his religion while attending a pagan school. While he was away, his father and mother-in-law converted to Christianity through St. Monica's example. Augustine returned home for their baptisms while refusing to consider conversion. His morality only went down after this. It was in this time of darkness that he began to question his current religion. He decided to travel to Rome in search of the truth. He decided to believe nothing at all. However, because of his intelligence, he gained popularity in Rome. It was because of his prestigious position that he was able to meet Saint Ambrose. Through the influence of Saint Ambrose and the prayers of his mother, who soon followed him to Italy, Augustine converted to the Catholic Church.

Bishop Pohlmeier spoke of Monica's hope for her son. It isn't the same as the hope we must grow in ourselves to reach Heaven. This hope takes, not only hope for the other person, but also a strong sense of hope ourselves. Augustine had gone so far away from the church, his home, and his family. There must have been times when Monica doubted whether there was any hope left for him. He obstinately refused to listen to Monica for so long. He was the worst of her children, and yet, she stayed closest to him. She trusted in God more than her own life. She trusted that He could work a miracle in the life of her son. And He did.

We too must strive for this hope. We must always believe in the mercy of God. Even those who seem to have gone farthest away from God are able to return. Through fervent and genuine prayer, like that of Saint Monica, we can hope that they will find the love of Jesus in His Divine Mercy. This prayer is very difficult to maintain. You might pray for someone your whole life, and nothing ever changes. But for another, you may pray long and hard and one day, they return. Of course, you must do more than pray for someone to help their conversion take place. Engage in peaceful conversation with them. Try to figure out where they're coming from so you can provide guidance. You must keep learning more about your faith to help others grow. If someone asks you a question you don't know the answer to, be honest and tell them you will explore it. Consult a priest or other knowledgeable person you know. It is perfectly fine to ask for guidance when talking about the faith. The key is to talk and to share your light. As my grandfather once told my dad, if you don't swing the bat, you'll never get a hit. Pray for others, learn about your Faith, and strive to grow in hope. I hope you have a blessed week where you grow in hope for yourself and others!

Just a note to say hello! The end of September is upon us and the first semester of the academic year here at St. John's Seminary is in full swing. It is good to be back in this place to complete my formation for ordination to the Sacred Priesthood of Jesus Christ. I am taking 5 classes which will help me to become, I pray, a holy priest, especially the Sacraments of Healing (Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick), and of course our class on the actual celebrating of Holy Mass. In this class, we fully vest as a priest and have practice Masses in the chapel. The first time I did this, putting on the vestments was surreal and saying the words of consecration were emotional. I am so in love with the Eucharist, that I cannot wait to truly celebrate it next summer. The other classes will provide a foundation with certain pastoral needs in the parish community. I am also assigned to a local parish in Boston to serve my Diaconal role. My parish is St. Paul's, Cambridge, which is located at Harvard. To see the faithful flood the church at all 5 masses with young college students, and families is so inspiring. The Harvard Catholic Center is flourishing, and St. Paul's is the center of that ministry. Yes, the semester is a busy one, but that will make it pass by even faster. I will officially be completed with the academic portion of formation in mid-December, when I will return to the Diocese of Rochester to complete the final six months of my Diaconate before my priestly ordination in June.

Please be assured of my continued prayers for you all and I ask that you remember me in yours.

The 2025-2026 Catholic Ministries Appeal (CMA) general mailing went out this week.

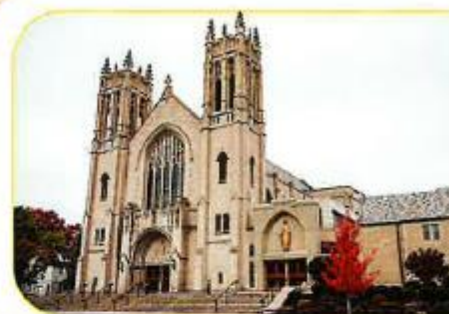

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An Invitation from Bishop Matano

On Sunday, October 5, 2025, united with all arch/dioceses throughout the United States, we will celebrate *Respect Life Sunday*, praying for a renewed respect for all human life from the moment of conception until natural death.

United to these prayers will certainly be our prayers for peace, especially in our own country where violence continues to claim innocent lives. We still are reeling from the tragic shooting of Annunciation Catholic School children in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Over this last week our country experienced the taking of Charles Kirk's life, another victim of an unconscionable, inhumane act. Regardless of one's political views, such a wanton disregard for human life can never be justified. In the Book of Exodus in the Old Testament, Moses receives the Ten Commandments, where inscribed on the two stone tablets there is contained the fifth commandment, "You shall not kill." (Exodus 20:13); in the New Testament, Jesus speaks these words: "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." (John 10:10). Every tragic death destroys not only one life, but wounds other lives, the lives of parents, of spouses, of children. One can only imagine the deep grief felt by families in Minnesota and in other places that see their children's lives so brutally ended; the pain of the Kirk family which mourns the death of a husband and father. How can such cruel actions not affect the hearts of all people of good will?

Leaders of government must cross the aisles and enter into dialogue, civilized dialogue, devoid of hostility, without vulgarity and animosity, without inflammatory language, transcending individual prejudices and seeking the common good and paving the way for our children to inherit a world where the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness flourish. But the work of establishing peace is not only that of elected officials. Every person is called to be a bearer of peace, of reconciliation, of kindness and charity. His Eminence, Timothy Cardinal Dolan, Archbishop of New York, recently reminded us: "It's important to reclaim the idea that we are all made in the image and likeness of God, and that each person deserves to be treated with dignity and respect. It is a most dangerous, and sometimes literally deadly idea that other people are not worthy of our respect, whether it be a newly arrived immigrant, an unborn baby in her mother's womb, an elder in the last stages of life, a person of another race or faith, or even a member of a different political party." (*New York Post*, September 17, 2025).

Over these last days, we did hear among some a plea to return to Church, to places of worship. Our Catholic faith tells us that it is in the presence of Jesus Christ in the Most Holy Eucharist that we find our heart, our soul, our very reason for living and life's purpose. It is time regularly to cross over the threshold of our churches and in humility beg God's forgiveness for our own acts against charity and plead for His gift of peace, to hear loud and clear in every corner of society the words of His Son on that first Easter Sunday: "Peace be with you." (John 21:19); His gentle and loving wish: "That they all may be one." (John 17:21). For there, in worshipping God in spirit and truth (cf. John 4:24), we too become harbingers of peace.

Let us strive for this unity, mourn in prayer the innocent lives lost, and the beloved dead whom we cherish, honoring them by honoring Jesus Christ.

Please, join with me in praying for peace, an end to violence and to respect others as children of God, at the ***Respect Life Mass on Sunday, October 5, 2025, at the 11:15 AM Mass at the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart***. This is not just an ordinary invitation, it is one rooted in our faith and in fulfillment of Jesus' command: "Love one another."
